An Exclusive Community Band Festival

The third annual **National Community Concert Band Sousa Festival** will feature individual and massed performances by six carefully-selected adult community concert bands. **The festival's theme commemorates the 65th Anniversary of the End of World War II, and the finale performance will take place at the National World War II Memorial.** Additionally, repertoire will emphasize the life and influence of John Philip Sousa on the American Band movement. In conjunction with the National Park Service, the Mount Vernon Ladies' Association, and the U.S. Navy Memorial, Music Celebrations International annually invites bands of the highest quality throughout the country to participate in the annual concert series, the National Festival of the States, which features these ensembles in the most prestigious venues available with the greatest potential for audiences. We are excited to be organizing an exclusive community band festival in our nation's capital.



Washington, D.C. is a town of much renown: it is a government town, a company town, a scandalous town and the political capital of the world. But Washington also has another significant distinction – it is a musical town. In a city that claims *Duke Ellington*, *Pearl Bailey*, *Jelly Roll Morton* and *Shirley Horn*, it is expected that jazz not only be appreciated, but showcased. The city's proximity to the Appalachian Mountains led to bluegrass and country first finding a large forum in the Washington, D.C. area. The first nationally televised country music concert was broadcast from Constitution Hall in 1948.

John Philip Sousa, "The March King," was born in Washington, D.C., to John António de Sousa and Maria Elisabeth Trinkhaus. His parents were of Portuguese and Bavarian (German) descent. John first learned the violin beginning at age 6. He was found to have absolute pitch. When the young Sousa reached the age of 13, his father, a trombonist in the Marine Band, enlisted his son in the United States Marine Corps as an apprentice. The boy soon attempted to run away and join a circus. John served his apprenticeship for seven years, until 1875, and apparently learned to play all the wind instruments while honing his mettle with the violin.

Several years later, John left his apprenticeship to join a theatrical (pit) orchestra where he learned to conduct. He returned to the U.S. Marine Band as its head in 1880, and remained as its conductor until 1892. Sousa also led the marching band of Gonzaga College High School. Sousa organized his own band in 1892. It toured widely, and in 1900, represented the United States at the Paris Exposition before touring Europe. Sousa repeatedly refused to conduct on the radio, fearing a lack of personal contact with the audience. He was finally persuaded to do so in 1929 and became a smash hit. Sousa died in 1932.

Conductor Emeritus, The United States Air Force Band, Professor Emeritus, George Mason University

Col. Arnald D. Gabriel retired from the United States Air Force in 1985 following a distinguished 36 year military career, at which time he was awarded his third **Legion of Merit** for his service to the United States Air Force and to music education throughout the country. He served as **Commander/Conductor** of the internationally renowned **U.S. Air Force Band, Symphony Orchestra**, and **Singing Sergeants** from **1964 to 1985**. In **1990**, he was named the first **Conductor Emeritus** of the USAF Band at a special concert held at DAR Constitution Hall in Washington, D.C.

Col. Gabriel served on the faculty of George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia, from **1985 to 1995**, as **Conductor** of the **GMU Symphony Orchestra** and as **Chairman, Department of Music** for eight of those years. In recognition of his ten years service to the university, he was named **Professor Emeritus of Music**.

A combat machine gunner with the United States Army's famed **29th Infantry Division** in Europe during WW II, Gabriel received two awards of the **Bronze Star Medal**, the **Combat Infantryman's Badge** and the French **Croix de Guerre**.

Col. Gabriel's professional honors include the very first **Citation of Excellence** awarded by the National Band Association, the Mid-West National Band and Orchestra Clinic's **Gold Medal of Honor** and its **Distinguished Service to Music Award**, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia's **New Millennium Lifetime Achievement Award** and its rarely presented **National Citation** for "significant contributions to music in America," Kappa Kappa Psi's **Distinguished Service to Music Award**, Phi Beta Mu's **Outstanding Contribution to Bands Award**, and the **St. Cecilia Award** from the University of Notre Dame. Col. Gabriel was inducted into the **National Band Association Hall of Fame of Distinguished Band Conductors**, becoming the youngest person ever to have received this honor, and was an inaugural inductee to the **Distinguished Alumni Wall of Fame** of Cortland High School in Cortland, New York. He is also a **Past President** of the prestigious **American Bandmasters Association**.

Hotel check-out

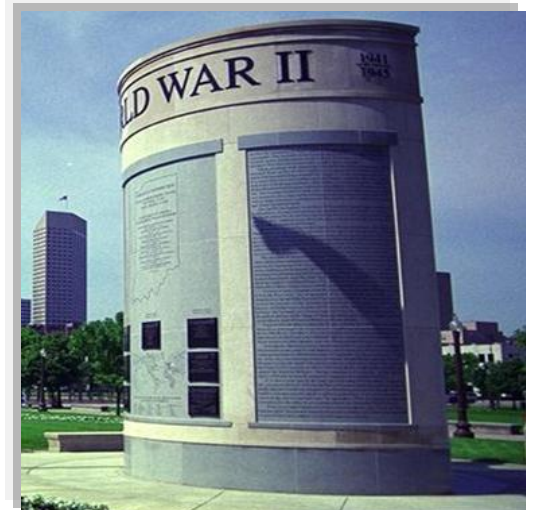

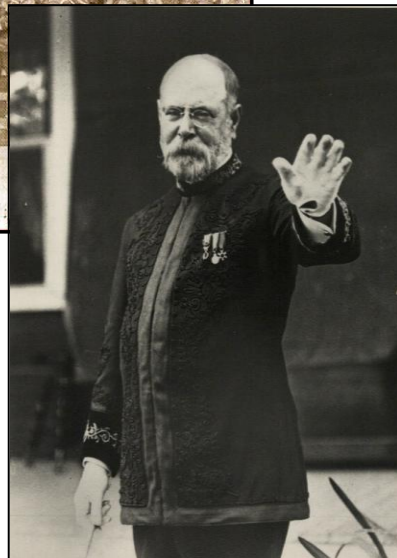
