Departure via scheduled air service to Manchester, England

Day 2

Manchester / York

Arrive in Manchester

Meet your MCI Tour Manager, who will assist the group to the awaiting motorcoach for transfer to York. Upon arrival, enjoy an orientation tour including time to walk the walls and ramparts

York - in AD 71, the Roman Ninth Legion built a fortress, Eboracum, later capital of the northern province. Here, in AD 306, Constantine the Great was proclaimed Emperor. In AD 866, the Vikings captured the city which became Jorvik. Scandinavian influence, custom and street names continued long after the Norman conquest. Medieval York, its prosperity based on wool, was a city of 10,000 people and forty churches, the richest city in the country after London

Visit York Minster (the largest medieval cathedral in England). Also visit the Shambles (the most visited among many streets with overhanging timber-framed houses), and many other attractions

Morning transfer to Warwick via Peak District National Park (Britain's first national park, established in April 1951) in Derbyshire. The Peak District also has many unique and friendly towns, all worth a visit. Whether you're looking to relax with a quiet stroll and lunch in one of the many renowned eateries, or hoping to pick up a bargain in the mix of High Street shops, factory outlets, craft fairs, farmers markets or individual specialist shops, the local towns and villages of Derbyshire are sure to delight

Warwick was the ancestral seat of the Earls of Warwick, who played a pivotal role in the Wars of the Roses. Despite a devastating fire in 1694, Warwick remains a treasure-house of medieval architecture with rich veins of history and charming streets, dominated by the soaring turrets of Warwick Castle

Day 5**Warwick / Stratford****(B,D)**

Breakfast at the hotel

Excursion to Stratford to enjoy a tour of the Shakespeare properties. Start with the half-timbered house that is Shakespeare's Birthplace. The house itself is part museum and part shrine and is of course, the house where the bard was born in 1564. Then visit Anne Hathaway's Cottage, which is situated around one mile outside of Stratford. In truth, the cottage is more a farmhouse than a cottage. See the Hathaway bed in addition to the beautiful gardens, orchard and Shakespeare tree garden. Also visit Holy Trinity Church, which occupies a truly magical setting amongst some trees next to the river. The church itself is typically English, demonstrated by the tower, transepts and the perpendicular nave and aisle. Shakespeare is buried on the north side of the chancel

**Day 6****Warwick / Oxford / Windsor / London (B,D)**

Breakfast at the hotel

Transfer to London via Oxford to tour the world-famous town. The city of Oxford grew up around the University of Oxford - one of the world's oldest and most prestigious seats of learning. The importance and wealth of the university is projected through the scale and grandeur of the college buildings throughout the city. Pass some of the oldest colleges such as the 13th Exeter College, the impressive Bodleian Library and Baliol College, which is something of an assembly line for British Prime Ministers

Lunch, on own

Continue to Windsor for a tour of Windsor Castle, built 900 years ago by William the Conqueror to guard the western approach to London. Today, it is England's largest castle and also the largest inhabited stronghold in the world. Highlights of the visit will be St. George's Chapel and, subject to royal commitments, the State Apartments

Continue on to London for dinner and overnight

Established 1,250 years ago by King Aethelbald, London became an important Roman city. It was resettled by the Saxons in the fifth century, after the end of the Roman occupation. London has been scourged by the plague (1665) and was almost entirely destroyed by the Great Fire (1666). World War II's "Blitzkrieg" tore up the city considerably. She stands today as a monument to perseverance, culture, excitement, history, and greatness

**Day 7****London****(B,D)**

Breakfast at the hotel

A guided tour of London includes the residential and shopping districts of Kensington and Knightsbridge. Pass Westminster Abbey, where most English Kings and Queens have been crowned since 1066, and where many are buried. See Whitehall and Trafalgar Square with Nelson's Column, pass Big Ben and the Houses of Parliament to Buckingham Palace, where we may see the Changing of the Guard. Continue along Fleet Street to St. Paul's Cathedral, and also see the 900-year-old Tower of London, whose
